I. PURPOSE

To establish a clear framework for the delivery of emergency notifications as required by the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act.

II. **RESPONSIBILITY**

Emergency Notifications should be released in most instances by the Executive Director, Campus Safety after consultation with the Vice President for Facilities Planning and Operations.

Members of the Emergency Management Group, including, but not limited to, the Vice President of Facilities Planning and Operations, Vice President of Enrollment and Student Affairs, Vice President of Academic Affairs, Vice President of Technology Innovation/CIO, Executive Director of Campus Safety, Dean of Students, and Executive Director of Strategic Communications are responsible for decision making during an emergency involving any LSSC location, however, emergency notifications shall be issued without prior meeting, by designated individuals (see section 4.C.), based upon the immediate nature of the situation making the notification necessary.

III. OBJECTIVES

Lake-Sumter State College is committed to providing a safe and secure educational environment for students, faculty, staff and visitors. As required by the Clery Act, timely warnings will be issued to alert students, employees, and visitors to **potentially dangerous situations** on and around LSSC campuses; emergency notifications will be issued to alert students, employees, and visitors to **immediate danger** on an LSSC campus.

- a. Emergency Notification: to alert students, employees, and visitors to any significant emergency or dangerous situation occurring on the campus involving an immediate threat to health or safety.
- b. Timely Warning: to alert students, employees, and visitors to Clery Act crime* that represents a serious or continuing threat to them.

*Clery Act crimes- murder, non-negligent homicide, manslaughter by negligence, rape, fondling, incest, statutory rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary,

motor vehicle theft, arson, domestic violence, dating violence, stalking, weapons violations, drug violations, liquor law violations, hate crimes.

IV. EMERGENCY NOTIFICATIONS

- a. An emergency notification is triggered by any significant emergency or dangerous situation on campus. The event may be currently on-going or presenting an immediate threat to a campus location.
- b. An emergency notification should be delivered immediately upon becoming aware of the emergency/threatened emergency.
- c. Each campus has individuals designated to immediately issue emergency notifications:

Leesburg: Executive Director, Strategic Communications, Executive Director, Campus Safety, Campus Safety Staff Assistant

South Lake/Four Corners: Dean of Students, Senior Staff Specialist, Admissions, Campus Safety Manager

Sumter: Associate Dean of Students, Senior Staff Assistant

System-wide: Executive Director, Strategic Communications, Executive Director, Campus Safety, Campus Safety Manager, Campus Safety Staff Assistant

- d. Notification of an emergency may come in a variety of ways. If possible, Campus Security will verify the nature and location of the emergency and provide that information to one of the designated individuals as quickly as possible.
- e. Once aware of the emergency, the designated individual will, without delay, and considering the safety of the community, determine the content of the notification and activate the LSSC Alert system, unless issuing a notification will, in the professional judgement of the designated individual, compromise efforts to assist victims, or to contain, respond to, or otherwise mitigate the emergency.
- f. The designated individual will continue to update the LSSC Alert system as useful information becomes available throughout the emergency.
- g. Once there is confirmation that the emergency is resolved, an LSSC Alert will be sent to make notification that there is no longer an emergency.
